"Are We Not Instruments Of

Destiny?"

In looking at history, we see that great events have occurred around some person of great influence, i.e., Martin Luther King Jr, Medger Evers, George Washington Carver; etc. In times of great national distress, it is nothing short of providential guidance that certain people have been placed in certain places with certain qualifications, i.e., Barack H. Obama and the pursuit of Osama Bin-laden.

As Christians, our influence also has far-reaching results (1 Thess. 1). We may not even realize the small part that we play in the process, but to the extent that we influence history, we are instruments of destiny.

A case in point is the providence found in the story of Esther. At the beginning of the story, we see the wife of King Xerxes (Vashti) being ousted because of her stubbornness and refusal to attend a royal banquet (Est. 1). Because her defiance was looked upon as a threat to the king's supremacy and authority, a decree was put out against her, and fair young virgins were sought to replace her. The king was smitten with Esther's beauty and as a result, was made queen in place of Vashti (Est. 2).

Esther soon disclosed a plot to exterminate all of the Jews and assassinate King Xerxes (Est. 2:21-23; 3). Because of her position as queen, Esther was able to spare her people from disaster. However, there was a real danger, in that she herself might not survive when her real identity as a Jewess was discovered (Est. 4).

When Esther's relative, Mordecai, saw her unique position as queen, he urged her to reveal the plot to the king. He challenged her with the same haunting question which now lays claim on us: "And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" (Est. 4:14 ESV).

As lights shining in a world of spiritual darkness (Mt. 5:14-16; Phil. 2:14-16), are we not instruments of destiny? (Mt. 28:19-20; Mk 16:15-16; cf. 1 Cor. 9:16-23).

The 5 "W's" of Influence

One of the best ways for anyone to fully grasp and appreciate a word, an idea, or an event is to use the five "W's" of journalism: what, who, when, where, and why.

When Jesus said, "Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid. Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Mt. 5:14-16), He was speaking of our influence. Influence is a very integral part of a Christian's life, and this can be clearly seen by using this great tool of journalism.

The WHAT of influence. Influence is the power one has in affecting a person or an event. We through our actions and words WILL affect others to do this or that, to say this or that, or to think this or that. From a scriptural point of view, each Christian has the power to influence others to do good or evil.

The WHO of influence. Who do we affect through our influence? The ones we have the most influence over is our immediate family. Our children watch us like a hawk, they watch our every move, and file in memory our every move. Children are great imitators of their parents — which shows the powerful influence parents possess. Also, by what we do (or fail to do) and say (or fail to say) we affect the lives of our neighbors, fellow Christians, and most people we come in contact with on a daily basis.

The WHEN of influence. When do we affect people through our influence? We may have an opportunity at almost any moment. Many times, if not most, we are influencing others without our knowledge. The "when" of influence may come at most any time – when we meet someone, or even when someone hears of our actions. The possibility of influence is ever present.

The WHERE of influence. Where might we be influential? Anywhere! We may be influencing others in the workplace, at home, at the ball game, in school, in the car, in the store, or in the worship assembly. Wherever we go our influence follows.

The WHY of influence. Why is our influence so important? It is important because many will be saved or lost as a result thereof. Jesus said, "But whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea" (Mt. 18:6). It is easy to see why influence is vitally important.

"There let you light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and GLORY YOUR FATHER [the "why"] which is in heaven" (Mt. 5:16).
